This quarter also witnessed unprecedented support from Mysore District In charge Minister and Co-operation Minister Sri S T Somashekhar. Sir mobilized Rs.3.25 crore for Mysore Zoo from his friends and well wishers from his constituency so that zoo could tide over difficult time without compromising animal welfare. We also received donation from Infosys Foundation and RBI under CSR component. We being a self sustained institute and drastic fall in revenue due to closure of zoo for visitors and less number of visitors visiting zoo post opening of zoo, donation of donors values more than normal time. The financial assistance received in the form of animals adoption and donations during this quarter is ever highest in the 127 years history of Mysore Zoo. This trust and support of people definitely motivates us to work even harder and to stand up to the expectations of the society.

In difficult times we tried to ensure our continued contribution towards creation of awareness about wildlife and its conservation by using both conventional and modern tools. We conducted e summer camp to facilitate participation from home during COVID situation. Its been a great learning in terms of developing and executing standard operating procedure to ensure the safety of zoo animals, zoo staff and zoo visitors.

I thank all my colleagues at Mysore Zoo, Member Secretary Zoo Authority of Karnataka, Karnataka Forest Department and the Karnataka State Government for their continued support to Mysore Zoo.

2. e-SUMMER CAMP 2020

Amidst of COVID-19 pandemic condition, Mysuru zoo initiated an innovative program i.e. e-summer camp with the aim of providing basics knowledge about Captive Wild Animals Management and Wildlife Conservation. In this program, 22 interested students from 7th standard to 12th standard were selected. It was a 10 day program held from 28th May to 06th June 2019.

The students were taught about various aspects about the zoo and its management, animal behaviour, environment conservation and wildlife laws through online classes. A one day visit to the zoo was provided for the students, post reopening of the zoo which gave them a practical exposure towards captive management of wild animals. Certificates were provided for the students by the end of the day during the visit.




















3. World Giraffe Day 2020

World Giraffe Day is an annual event initiated by Giraffe Conservation Foundation (GCF) to celebrate the longest-necked animal on the longest day of the year -21 June- every year.

The Giraffe is the tallest mammal in the world and are listed as Vulnerable TO EX-TINCTION on the IUCN Red List of Threatened Species. Their numbers in Africa have plummeted by a staggering 40% over the



last 30 years. In 2019, it is estimated that there are nearly 1,00,000 giraffe remaining in all of Africa. This worldwide annual event is meant to raise support, create awareness and provide a deeper understanding of the challenges that these animals face in the wild. Mysore zoo houses 4 female and 4 male Rothschild's giraffe, of which 2 are young calves. To contribute to this worldwide celebration Mysuru Zoo has taken initiative to increase awareness about this species.

The Giraffe Conservation Foundation dedicates this year's World Giraffe Day – 21st June 2020 to Operation Twiga V, the fifth dedicated giraffe conservation translocation of giraffes in Uganda.

4. Standard operating guidelines during lock down at Mysuru Zoo on account of COVID-19 pandemic

On account of the increase in the incident of COVID-19 cases and as a precautionary measure to contain the spread of the disease, Mysuru Zoo and Karanji Lake Nature Park was shut down for visitors from 15th of March 2020 in view of animal and public health and safety. During this course the following measures were adopted to ensure the welfare of animals and staff.

I.Staff screening

- •Every personnel were asked to walk through foot dips at the entrance gate and were also screened for temperature by infrared thermometer. They were enquired, if they showed any respiratory signs at the entry gate.
- •All the staff were directed to use sanitizer at the entry gate.





II.Staff dress change





•Staffs were asked to change their dress at the cloak room facility provided at the entry gate and Personal Protective Equipments (PPE) were provided before they entered the premises.

III.Biosecurity measures









- •Medicated foot-dip soaked with anti-microbial agent at the entrance gates through which all staff and vehicles must pass through so that any microbe attached to foot-wears and tyres are removed.
- •There are foot-dip soaked with anti-microbial agent, hand wash, hand sanitizers, gloves, gum boots and masks at every animal enclosure for the use of keepers, supervisors and veterinarians.
- •All animal enclosures are daily cleaned and sanitized with antimicrobial agents.
- •Entire Zoo area and animal enclosures are sanitized periodically.

IV.Animal health care and management

- •Highest level of hygiene is maintained at Kitchen and store unit.
- •All animals are fed with quality food and fodder. The quality of food materials personally checked and certified by the zoo veterinarians before feeding to the animals. In case of beef, it is sourced from Government Licensed certifies slaughter house and beef quality is certified by Veterinarian of City Municipal Corporation.
- •The beef processing unit was shifted away from store and kitchen unit and also the beef is processed in a hygienic condition.
- •Even food material carrying vehicles also need to pass through the trough filled with antimicrobial solution so that any microbes attached to tire of vehicle are removed.
- •To avoid contact of outsiders other than zoo personnel, private vehicles carrying feed only with drivers were allowed inside and zoo staffs were only deployed for catering of grass and other food materials for the animals.
- •All animals are observed closely by their respective animal keepers, veterinarians, biologist and supervisors. If needed, spotting scopes, binoculars and CC cameras are also used to monitor animals.





V.Staff welfare and advice

- •All the staffs were advised to maintain social distancing and to wear mask compulsorily. Also they were instructed not to visit enclosures other than allotted ones thereby maintain highest degree of hygiene.
- •Awareness was created amongst all the zoo staff by involving district health authorities.

SAFET FIRST

- •Staffs with symptoms of COVID 19 have been asked to inform the zoo office, consult District Health Authorities.
- •Most of the meetings of Officers are being conducted over mobiles.
- •Staff coming from COVID 19 positive cases area, are advised to follow strict home quarantine.

5. Reopening of Zoo post COVID-19 lockdown

As a precautionary measure to contain the spread of the pandemic COVID-19 disease, Mysuru Zoo and Karanji Lake Nature Park was shut down for visitors from 15th of March 2020 in view of animal and public health and safety. After receiving the order from Government of Karnataka and Member Secretary, Zoo Authority of Karnataka, Mysuru Zoo was prepared to welcome its visitors on 8th of June with a standard operating guidelines. Along with the reopening of the zoo, several other events like inauguration of new Jaguar enclosure, naming the Giraffe calves and honouring the District In-charge Minister Sri. S T Somashekar was taken up.

Honourable Co-operation Minister & Mysuru District In-charge Minister Sri. S.T. Somashekar dedicated Sri Zoological Chamarajendra Gardens and Karanji Nature Park, Mysuru for public viewing post COVID-19 lockdown. Smt. Sumalatha Ambareesh, Member of Parliament, Mandya District, Sri. Prathap Simha, Member of Parliament, Mysore and Kodagu District, Sri. G.T. Devegowda, MLA, Chamundeshwari Constituency, Sri. Ramdas, MLA, Krishnaraja Constituency, Sri. Nagendra, MLA, Constituency, Chamaraja Harshavardhan MLA Nanjangudu, Hon'ble Mayor Smt. Tasneem, Mysuru City Corporation, Sri. B.P. Ravi IFS, Additional Principal Chief Conservator of Forests and Member Secretary, Zoo Authority of Karnataka, Sri. Abhiram G. Sankar, Deputy Commissioner, Mysuru, Smt. Chaya Naveen, Corporator, Ittigegudu and others graced the occasion.

Standard Operating Guidelines for reopening of zoo

- Considering the carrying capacity of zoo, it is estimated that around 8000 individuals per day can be allowed to visit the zoo.
- Visitors without any symptoms of COVID-19 are only allowed and adults above 65 years are advised not to visit zoo and stay safe.
- Only those visitors wearing mask are allowed to enter the zoo if not they are instructed to buy masks at the entrance gate and also hand sanitizes are provided at the entrance.
- All visitors are checked for temperature using infrared thermometer.
- Tickets are issued to visitors wearing proper PPE kits and at the same time visitors are encouraged to book tickets online
- Informative signage boards have been put up at the entrance and other points to educated the visitors regarding the Do's and Don'ts.
- Visitors are advised not to touch barricades and maintain social distance.
- Sanitizers and hand wash have been placed at washrooms.
- To avoid contamination risk, hand sanitizers and paper cups have been placed at drinking water point to facilitate visitor's drinking water facility



6. Successful breeding and rearing of Ruddy Shelduck (Tadorna ferruginea)

On 27th of April 2020, seven Ruddy Shelduck chicks were hatched at japan pond enclsoure. Both the parents and chicks were shifted to small confinmnet area for close monitoring. Both the parents nurtured the chicks well.







7. Recent Development Works

a. Feeding enrichment for Slender Tailed Meerkats

Enrichment is an animal husbandry principle that encompasses change within the given habitat or environment to enhance the physiological and psychological behaviour in animals and also provides an opportunity for an animal in captivity to express wild behaviour patterns. In wild, animals spend most of their time in foraging, processing food, constructing nests, dens and defending territories. Their activities would be centred mainly in meeting their needs. As intensive management of the above needs would be fulfilled in captive environments, this significantly reduces the time an animal spends in these pursuits. Therefore to stimulate the natural behaviour, alternative methods have to be provided in terms of enrichment.

Meerkats are excellent foragers and hiding food in the enclosure stimulates natural feeding behaviour. Mysuru zoo houses 2:4 meerkats and here at Mysuru Zoo to stimulate and enhance foraging activity, a medium size pumpkin was hallowed at two sides and feed was offered through this. The feed included fruits such as apple, grapes vegetables such as carrot and egg. Since this was the very first time for the meerkats, initially they were reluctant and later with their sensing ability they found the way to grab the food through the holes. Here another interesting observation was that there was an associative foraging and has finished all the feed that was offered.

Apart from the above said feed, meerkats are also offered with mealworms and grasshoppers to supplement protein diet. This time a bamboo feeder was designed and placed horizontally with the support on sides. The bamboo was pierced with holes measuring 1.5 inches, in a row with 3 cm apart. Mealworms were placed inside the bamboo through these holes and left for the meerkats to forage. These opportunistic species waited very patiently had grabbed on each of the worms that came out through these holes. Through such activities, they tend to spend more time in these activities there by reducing stress to some extent.




